## Dialectic Journal Instructions and Sample

## **INSTRUCTIONS:**

Your journal needs to be either in a composition/spiral notebook or in an organized digital document. You may use one physical notebook for multiple texts.

If my summer reading book is *The Great Gatsby*, I would take the total number of pages (180) and divide it into 10 equal sections. You'll write a response for every section.

• 180/10 = 18, so every 18 pages, I will write a response.

On the page, draw a line down the center of the page. The left side of the page should be labeled TEXT and the right column RESPONSE.

In the TEXT column, copy passages exactly as they appear in the text (provide page numbers). In the RESPONSE column, write about the passages. DO NOT MERELY SUMMARIZE THE PLOT OR RESTATE THE PASSAGE. Each RESPONSE must be at least 50 words.

## How do you choose what passages to write down?

Passages become important if

- i. Details in the passage seem important to you.
- ii. You learn something significant about a character.
- iii. You recognize a pattern (recurring images, ideas, colors, symbols, descriptions, details, etc.).
- iv. You agree or disagree with something a character says or does.
- v. You find an interesting or potentially significant quotation.
- vi. You notice something important or relevant about the author's writing style.
- vii. You notice effective use of literary devices.
- viii. You think that the passage contributes to or reveals a theme in the novel.
